

This resource is for artists looking to expand their practice through sharing skills and ideas, generating creative projects with communities, or co-creating and collaborating with other people.



- Everyone brings something (creativity, ideas, potential, past experiences, expectations both positive and negative, energy, etc.)
- Be clear about your role
- Define what a positive outcomes would look like for all the people involved
- Be mindful of everyones time and energy
- Share trust
- Make your care evident
- Materials and time are gifts
- Create the conditions for creative freedoms
